ATs Care Committee Report – Lisa Kenney

NWATA Team Planning

- The NWATA ATs Care team is currently under construction, with a handful of people attending the Assisting Individuals in Crisis training this weekend, and others scheduled to attend the same training in New Orleans.
- 1-2 team members from each state within the district
- Currently working on Policies and Procedures in line with the national committee
- Once all are trained as peer support providers, team will be registered with CISM

From the NATA office:

- An online system has been implemented for reporting critical incidents, found on the NATA website. The email address (atscare@nata.org) and hotline (972-532-8821) are live as well.
- Current NWATA numbers (August 1,2017 March 1, 2018)

- o Total Critical Incidents Reported: 10
- Total ATs Care Services Rendered: 8 remotely and/or in person
- AT was directly impacted in 3 events, indirectly in 7.
 - Direct AT Impact: gave CPR, patient was spine boarded, family member passes away, etc.
 - Indirect AT Impact: athlete/patient injured in a car accident, shooting, etc.
- o Athletic Related Incident: 1; Non Athletic Related: 9
- Total Fatalities: 8, none of which were athletic related
- Around the Nation:
 - 43 states (including DC) have had at least one incident reported since August 1.
 - Texas has the most reported incidents at 20, New Jersey has the second most at 13
 - ATs Care has had an impact on 481 ATs and AT Students
 - o 179 Total Incidents have been reported
- District and State Team Development:
 - Average time of response from incident to intervention: 72-96 hours
 - Average Cost for National CISM team travel: \$2,000
 - o These numbers will be reduced once local teams develop
- Future Training:
 - o Assisting Individuals in Crisis: June 25-26, 2018 @ NATA Convention
 - o ATs Care Team Refresher: June 26, 2018 @ NATA Convention

- Washington: Need Rep
- Idaho: We have a parent champion working diligently to convince her school to hire at AT.
- Montana: Kalispell Schools will retain AT positions after their ATs & team physicians lobbied to hospital CEO to keep positions intact!
- Alaska: Finally mapped!

Gatorade HS Practitioners Summit: Brought HS ATs, Sport Coaches, Strength & Conditioning Coaches, and Registered Dieticians together in Sarasota, Florida to collaborate on behalf of HS athlete. Great meeting and we are not alone in our plight to increase healthcare to the secondary school athlete.

Collaborative Solutions in Sport Safety: NFHS is hosting their own meeting in April

Hot Topic: Consent to Treat for Visiting Athletes. Our committee and NFHS SMAC both addressing issue

Educational Advancement – Phil Ford

• In partnership with the NATA REF the EAC is sponsoring at total of \$50,000 in grant funding for AT education research.

- The EAC is exploring the possibility offering "Seed Money" to support pre-proposals for REF grant submissions.

Governmental Affairs – Lynne Young

Montana:

Currently not in a legislative session this year. However they are monitoring any changes to the concussion law that may be upcoming. Current activities: They are in an active search to obtain a new lobbyist to represent their organization. Working on development of capitol hill day for January 2019. The Hill Day would help to promote awareness of the AT profession in preparation of any changes to the concussion legislation which may aim to restrict AT's from making RTP decisions.

Idaho:

Nothing new to report. Following active bills which may affect members

Washington:

Currently there are no formal legislative issues they are addressing at this time. Epinephrine Auto-injectors: The current status of epinephrine legislation in Washington state is not ideal for athlete safety nor for the ATs working in the secondary school setting. With training from the school nurse any staff member can administer the epi pen of an individual with a KNOWN allergy. This also affects transportation of the school-prescribed epi pen. They are continuing to work on determining the best course of action for making the necessary changes. The Washington ATs have been advised to carefully work their way in. Volunteer ATs: Language in the practice act is unclear regarding volunteer ATs. They are currently working with the Department of Health and the AT Advisory Committee to write WACs (rules and regulations) to provide some clarity. They believe the process may take a year or two to complete. Current activities also include actively watching a physical therapy bill HB2446 (heard for the first time 1/16/18). This bill currently does not pose a threat to ATs.

Alaska:

Currently focusing on incorporating outside youth comp/club programs into the concussion safety bill. These non school clubs do not fall under the current concussion law for concussion evaluation, management, and RTP increasing unnecessary risk. Working to draft and secure a sponsor to amend the current concussion legislation. Also beginning the process to see if obtaining a "legal interpretation" of how the AT licensure bill affects the non traditional setting ATs is in the best interest of our members. Beginning to explore the sponsoring a "youth safety bill" incorporating SCA and EAP requirements.

Oregon:

This legislative session: initial work was to continue to educate legislators on the athletic training profession. Members worked to add ATs into the health care providers allowed to RTP concussed athletes. This was

unsuccessful although during the last hearing there was increased testimony supporting ATs. They will work to correct this during the next session.

General NWATA GAC comments: We need to continue to track DME legislature as well as monitor current trends affecting ATs.

Name Change – PRC to PRAT

Mission Statement: The mission of the Professional Responsibility in Athletic Training Committee (PRAT) is to support the legal, ethical and regulatory (LER) standards of the AT Strategic Alliance by encouraging and promoting adherence. The PRAT collaboratively works with the Strategic Alliance to proactively inform professional practice by streamlining LER resources, educating professionals about how to exercise those standards and establishing an online presence.

Broken down into Subcommittees:

- 1. PRAT Website/page
- 2. Research
- 3. Awards
 - ✓ We gave out 2 awards this year (a member & non-member award) to recognize their professional responsibility in athletic training.
- 4. PRAT 21 Educate members on the "how to" be in compliance in LER issues in the professions.
 - ✓ Objectives prepare written "statements" for the member and get support from the Strategic Alliance partners.
 - Statements will reflect the application of "HOW TO" in a POSTIIVE way with a strong message
 - We discussed many topics and decided to start with 6 including an introductory paper:
 Duty to Report, Sexual Boundaries, Model Behavior in Communication, Social Media,
 Moral Code
 - iii. Releasing statements must be approved by Strategic Alliance before we can set release dates.
- 5. ACT ON IT Case Studies
 - ✓ Case Studies will cover LER issues & provide AT scenario examples
 - ✓ Case Studies format: 2 page max, 2-3 min read, "60sec commercial"
 - ✓ Blank ACT ON IT guide for the reader
